Elaboration Structure—Description

Definition: A Description "paints a picture" of your idea.

When to Use: Use this strategy when you want your reader to "see" your idea in all of its detailed glory.

Completion Checklist:

- 1. Does it support the idea in the topic sentence (without overlapping with the other topic sentences)?
- 2. Does it include specific details?

Length: 2-5 sentences.

In Context:



My neighborhood of the future would also include a community center. This center will be a large, brightly lit building that has space for a plethora of activities. A glistening indoor swimming pool can host senior citizen water aerobics on one side while allowing teens to practice diving on the other end. The activity rooms will range in size and arrangement to be the perfect homes for quiet games of chess, lively line dancing, or even a documentary screening. Samples:

- The current school uniform is a drab pairing of shapeless khaki pants and dull blue polo shirts. Accessorized with a brown belt and shoes, this paltry wardrobe selection is enough to put any student to sleep.
